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Comments:

-<u>This wasn't your best paper so far. The problem starts from the top—you got to have a thesis for</u> an essay. Your essay never had that focus. If there is one chief characteristic about an "essay," it is that it is about ONE THING. It presents and develops a single point.

Here is my saying for an essay without a thesis: "An essay without a thesis is like a ship that leaves port without a destination—it gets lost at sea."

If you decide to revise this essay for the portfolio, I recommend that you zero in on the idea that seems to be what you are getting at—she says the media images are to blame for women's problem with eating disorders and sexual abuse, but my experience is that there are other things to blame too that may be more to blame. Notice a key thing missing in your paper on the second half—"my experience." I missed seeing you bring in illustrations and examples from your own experience.

This paper has some potential, so it would be a good one to work on for the portfolio. It would call on you to work on things that are important for you to work on:

--creating an introduction

--developing a clear thesis

--including more specific support for your ideas

--creating a conclusion

Think about working on this one. I'll be happy to look at a revised copy.
